

In Bloom: Sisyrinchium rosulatum (Annual Blue-eyed grass)



Family: Iridaceae

The plant is easily identified in the field by its light blue flowers (with a dark center), compressed aerial stems, and ascending stems. The plant is a fast-growing annual which reaches only 15cm (6") in height and has spreading leaves that are only 0.25cm (0.1") wide and 6.5cm (3") long. The violet flowers are only 1cm (0.4") wide. It grows mainly on the coastal plain from North Carolina to Florida and west to Texas.

The genus name <u>Sisyrinchium</u> derives from the Greek "sisyrinchi(um)" meaning "an Iris-like plant". The species epithet **rosulatum** means "with leaf rosettes."

Also in bloom: Black Eyed Susans, Rudbeckia hirta; Bloodberry Cordia globosa; Buttonweed Spermacoce verticillata; Carolina Jessamine Gelsemium sempervirens; Hat pins Eriocaulon sp.; Jacquemontia Jacquemontia pentanthos; Marlberry Ardisia escallonioides; Marsh Fleabane Pluchea rosea; Yellow-eyed Grass Xyris sp. Trilliums and dogtooth violets bloom in Panhandle ravines. Bald cypress trees leaf out in Big Cypress Swamp.

Support Proposed Nutrient Standards

The St. Johns RIVERKEEPER is one of five groups involved in a settlement that resulted in the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) proposing **Numeric Nutrient Standards** (NNS) for the state of Florida. The nutrient standards would place limits on the **nitrogen and phosphorous pollution** that is poisoning Florida's rivers, streams, lakes and springs. Here are some things you should know:

- Nutrient pollution and algal blooms hurt our river, economy and quality of life. Economic losses can include a decline in property values, commercial fishery losses, medical costs to treat exposure to algal toxins, costs to treat drinking water, and lost revenues from recreational fishing, boating and tourism.
- The EPA stepped in because the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) was not adequately addressing this significant pollution problem. The narrative standards used in Florida provide that "in no case shall nutrient concentrations of a body of water be altered so as to cause an imbalance in natural populations of aquatic flora or fauna." Based on the massive algal blooms we continue to experience on the St. Johns River, this requirement is clearly not being met.
- The proposed Numeric Nutrient Standards (NNS) will provide clear water quality goals and measurable quantitative baselines, making it easier to establish targets and eventually meet the requirements of the Clean Water Act.
- The standards would be phased in over several years, allowing time for industries and communities to sufficiently comply.
- Florida is NOT being singled out by EPA to establish NNS. Nine states have already adopted some or all parameters for their rivers.

The St. Johns Riverkeeper need your help by supporting the EPA proposed standards. One of the three statewide public hearings will be held in Orlando to gather public comment (see "save the date" section below).

Join us in May 2010 for the FNPS 30th Anniversary!



Greater sandhill cranes migrate from Florida northward. Nesting season begins for ospreys in north Florida. Wild turkeys and quail mate in south Florida. Eastern moles and pocket gophers begin breeding, while gray squirrels are delivering their first litters and bear cubs are being born. American crocodiles begin mating and Leatherback sea turtles begin nesting on sandy beaches along the southeast coast. Watch for fireflies.
