A Message from our President

Every month I attend the business partner meeting with the Osceola County School district. Each month the meeting is held in a different location. One month it is held at a school in the county. The next month it is held in a local business partners location. This has allowed me to meet and see different schools as well as different businesses. From these meetings the following has happened or begun to happen:

Kids Closet: We have developed a working relationship with Home Depot and the school district. Landscaping was done on several days beginning September 1 with plants donated by Home Depot. We will use as many native plants as possible. Open House is scheduled for Sept. 14 from 4pm – 7 pm with local business partner restaurants serving food and drinks.

New Beginnings School: We have just started landscaping their grounds with a donation of used tires donated from Jeff Clay Tires. The used tires are to be filled with dirt, planted with flowers, and arranged around the reading tree for the students to use as benches. More used tires will be used as raised flower beds. A hedge will be planted around the perimeter as a living fence. We have a donation of dirt but are working on obtaining a truck to haul it to the school. After the dirt is at the school we will begin planting. We obtained a donation of 2 large planters for either side of the entry door. This donation came from Big Lots. We are looking for donations of non-wood picnic tables and chairs for teachers and students to be able to eat outside. We are looking for donations for raised beds for the vegetable gardens. We will be working at New Beginnings every Wednesday. I cannot put into words the excitement of the students and teachers at New Beginnings after just this first day of work. Kattya Graham and I did not feel as though we did much this first day and yet the students and teachers were excited beyond anything Kattya and I could have expected! The reward at this school is definitely going to be seeing the reaction of the students and teachers.

Horizon Middle School: At the business partner meeting yesterday I was asked about another project. The district built a concrete pad for the school buses that park at Horizon Middle School. Some of the residents that live next to Horizon Middle School do not like the looks of this concrete pad and would like to see a screen planted to shield their view. This area is sandy soil, dry, and has a power line right above it. I will be giving ideas to the district for what to plant here.

Westside School: Westside has a vegetable garden built that has grass growing in it. I also showed them some great areas that would be easy to plant some butterfly plants that would not be difficult to maintain yet would allow the students to interact with flowers, plants, and butterflies everyday while playing on the playground. They also have some dead trees that I suggested some alternate native trees to replace them with. We will be meeting again.

Pirates Cove Miniature Golf: When I first started going to these meetings I met Priscilla with Pirates Cove and mentioned that if they ever needed plant advice just ask. I also mentioned that if they redid some of their plantings that they could advertise to birders/butterfly lovers. They could get families who want both fun and birds. Anyway, that was long ago and I thought nothing more of it until yesterday when she came up to me. She said they spend so much money replacing plants that die, replacing annuals, and she has given my name to her boss and wants me to come out look around and give them ideas of what to plant that will bloom most of the year, will attract butterflies, birds, etc.

Sunrise Elementary School: Sunrise has asked for help planting their retention pond with wetland plants.

Highlands Elementary School: We still have a few wetland plants to go into their littoral zone pond. We still have to transplant their butterfly garden back to the school from the move to make way for construction. Seeds For Schools- We still have to get their wildflower garden planted.

YMCA: The YMCA in Kissimmee is enlarging and I asked at the business partner meeting about the plants they would be planting and if we could get some native plants planted. I have been put in contact with the person in charge of the building and we are in discussions now.

Legoland: Legoland will be opening Oct. 15. They have plans to start student programs for robotics. I am still talking to them about starting student programs for landscape and landscape architecture.

So, these business partner meetings are about working together whether it is a business or a school.

Species Spotlight

PARTRIDGE PEA (*Chamaecrista fasciculata*)

Annual erect legume plant that reaches a height of 1 to 3 feet. Readily self seeds. Leaves are sensitive and will close up when touched, much like mimosa.

This plant grows on a wide range of soils that are slightly acid to moderately alkaline. However, it grows best on moderately lime, well drained soils. Planting should be conducted when soil moisture is high.

Bloom Season: Mainly Mid-Summer to Mid-Fall

sources: Florida Wildflowers Growers Coop & USDA

Wildlife benefits: host plant for the Cloudless sulphur butterfly, nectar for bees, food for bobwhite quail, doves and deer.

Light Exposure: Full sun to high pine shade

The plant can be used to control erosion.

Germination: Seeds have a water impermeable seed coat. Scarify seeds to maximize germination. Sow seeds the same day they are scarified.

Caution: **can be toxic to cattle.**

Before and After – Cloudless Sulphur

(*Phoebis sennae*)

A Florida native larval host for this species is Partridge Pea (*Chamaecrista fasciculata*). Caterpillars are green while they are eating green leaves but turn yellow if they eat the flowers themselves. Larval hosts include other plants in the *Chamaecrista/Cassia* or *Senna* genus.
